

# Cost



It looked like the trip would be called off because the cost of flights and the tour in China part made the trip too expensive

We have had to cut the Shanghai section as was expected. Everything else though plus a remarkable bullet train ride through the stunning scenery around Guilin is still included.

The cost will be as stated: £2,700 per student. Added to this will be a separate payment for the cost of a visa (£151) and for those aged 16 and over: the Advanced Passenger Duty (£88). These are both government taxes for the respective countries (China and the UK ). There is no visa requirement to enter Hong Kong.



# Hong Kong



In HK we travel mainly by the subway system called the MTR. You will use an octopus called (bought for you) onto which you add further credit when we pass through a subway station. This is then used to cover travel around HK - plus you can use it to buy snacks etc. You can see on the map the route from the MTR to the hall of residence – about 20 mins or less if you use a local bus.

This is Festival Walk next to the local MTR where you can also buy food in the food court.







# An outline of likely expenditure

Spend list is always provided. The itinerary clearly states what meals are included.

Currency issues - you will need 3 currencies on this trip.

We can change all the currency together if needed.

A bank is run to help with expenditure

Will update on the latest ways of paying for things. QR code.

Visas and passports. £151 plus train ticket to and from Manchester to get it.

Will you be able to get back into the UK easily with your travel documents ?

# Insurance - RPA

A parent can be flown out in an emergency to bring their daughter home – this said the visa will still be needed.

Staff cannot leave the group or return home with a student because of ratios.

Insurance is great coverage and underwritten by UK government.

However, you need to ensure that you have your own insurance for phones, tablets etc is taken out.

## Risk assessment – medical and health issues

There will be at least 2 qualified first aiders. Mr Vane is also an Ex HM Inspector of Health and Safety as well as the schools current EVC (Educational Visits Co-Ordinator).

Must have MMR.

Not nut or sea food allergies (peanut oil is used everywhere in China) – the plane simply may refuse to carry you.

Sorry no vegans – can't be catered for.

You must be medically fit, mentally fit and have good attendance and behaviour in school. All are checked. Some who have had various issues have found the challenge of this long trip to be a real positive – even life changing!

# **Before departure each family is given a pack containing:**

**The final Itinerary**

**A sheet of Emergency Contact Details**

**Hotel contact details**

**The British Embassy in China details**

**THESE ARE FOR EMERGENCIES ONLY**

**Every participant** will be given an emergency contact card – the size of a credit card. Written in Chinese on one side and English on the other.

Also given out are currency converter tables (pocket sized laminated cards) to help work out the cost of items.

A serious breach of the agreed rules as contained in the risk assessment will result in a pupil being sent home. They will be taken to the airport and seen on the plane to the UK. Parents will have to meet them. Costs incurred are to be met by parents- this could run into many thousands of pounds

The simple rules which are followed:

- 1. Inviting person(s) not in the expedition party into your room without the permission of a member of staff is a serious breach of the rules.**
- 2. A failure to eat anything in HK could also result in being sent home. This will include problems with eating as well undisclosed diagnosed eating disorders. Though we have helped with some students with such disorders if known about beforehand.**
- 3. Going out alone and without permission.**
- 4. Please remember that there is a total ban on smoking and vapes and the consumption of alcohol for reasons of health and safety. This matter can be discussed with Mr Vane before travelling.**
- 5. All participants are reminded about the need to observe the instructions given to them. Meeting times are important to avoid inconvenience to others.**
- 6. Students may not buy knives, martial arts stars etc, lasers etc to bring home**

## Staffing and behaviour policy.

The pupil teacher ratio: 1 to 10

Staff on the trip: KV; Mrs K Simpson; Mrs L Hughes; Mr Knight; Miss K Leighton (Assistant Headteacher) others to follow.



**You must have at least one very good friend** with whom you will share a room. We tend to prefer groups of 2; 4 and 6 although if you are a 3 you will join with another group of 3 at times. **YOU SELECT YOUR GROUPS.** All students will be assigned a teacher to whom they **ALWAYS** register with at various times.

Students will be encouraged to mix in their groups at all times.

We will operate a buddy system. You will nominate 3 or 4 other people you would be happy to look after. One new person will then be selected for you to ensure that everyone has a buddy!
